It is the policy of the Oklahoma City Zoological Trust to ensure that communications with participants and members of the public with disabilities are as effective as communications with others. ADDRESSING THE OKLAHOMA CITY ZOOLOGICAL TRUST

Citizens may address the Trust on certain items by signing up to speak and providing the agenda item number, their reason for appearing, and their address, but all comments must be relevant to the item. Citizens may also address the Trust at the end of the agenda under "Citizens to be heard." Please contact the Zoo at 405-425-0231 at least 48 hours prior to the meeting, and leave a message that includes your name, the agenda item number, and the reason you would like to speak. Staff will submit requests received to the Chair. Please limit your comments to three (3) minutes or less.

The Chair or presiding officer may, in his or her discretion, prohibit a person from addressing the Trust, or have any person removed from the Auditorium, if that person commits any disorderly or disruptive behavior. Disorderly conduct includes, but is not limited to, any of the following: speaking without being recognized by the Chair or presiding officer; continuing to speak after notice that the speaker's allotted time has expired; presenting comments or material not relevant to the item under discussion; failing to comply with the lawful instructions of the Chair or presiding officer; or engaging in other conduct, activity, or speech that delays, disturbs, interferes, or disrupts the effective or timely conduct of the meeting, or is otherwise violent, threatening, abusive, obscene, or jeopardizes the safety of self or others. A person may also be subject to arrest and removal from the Auditorium

for violation of Oklahoma City Municipal Code 2020, § 30-81 – Disorderly conduct and/or violation of 21 Okla. Stat. § 280 – Willfully Disturbing, Interfering With or Disrupting State Business, Agency Operations or Employees.

TRUST ACTIONS

Official action can be taken only on items which appear on the agenda. The Trust may adopt, approve, ratify, deny, defer, recommend, amend, strike, or continue any agenda item. Other actions may also be taken.

When more information is needed to act on an item, the Trust may refer the matter to the Executive Director/CEO or the Municipal Counselor. The Trust may also refer items to standing committees of the Trust for additional study.

Under certain circumstances, items are deferred to a specific later date or stricken from the agenda entirely.

CONSENT DOCKET

Items listed under "Consent Docket" are usually approved as a group with the proper motion from a member of the Trust. Members of the Trust may request discussion or separate action on any item on the Consent Docket.

- **A.** Animal Care Jennifer D'Agostino, Chief Animal Programs Officer, gave the animal care update: our meerkats have arrived. We have a mob of ten and they are already a crowd favorite. Our Indian runner ducks are enjoying time outside in the koi pond and the gardens are blooming.
- **B.** Human Resources Tammy Burnett, CHRO, spoke about HR news: We have several new hires and currently eight vacancies. Our volunteer program continues to grow and is doing really well. Last week we hosted an appreciation event for our volunteers.
- **C.** PR & Marketing Greg Heanue, CMO, presented the PR & Marketing update: March set a new attendance record and puts us on track to make our attendance goal. During the month of March 38% of admissions were from discounted or free programs. Spring Break was our 9th best and the golden egg program was extremely popular. Group attendance at record numbers and member revenue beat goal by 32%. Tickets for Sip & Stroll are on sale and Breakfast with the Animals.
- **D.** OZS Mandy Heaps, OZS Executive Director, gave a summary of OZS news: Kirkpatrick Foundation funded grant request of \$60,000, Express Employment Int'l gave \$25,000, and Jackie and Robert Tilghman gave a \$10,000 match for Zoo Lovers Day. We recently hired a new Individual Gift Officer, Monica Simmons. Currently focused on donor tours and Gala planning. Our Zoo Employee campaign brought in over \$9,000.

SUBJECT: Master Plan 2024 for the Oklahoma City Zoo and Botanical Garden

Background: On February 22, 2023, the Oklahoma City Zoological Trust approved a

Contract for Architectural Services with SHR Studios, Inc., for Project No. MZ-0072, Master Plan for the Oklahoma City Zoo and Botanical Garden. The Contract's scope of work provided for the development of a ten-year master plan with the following components: (1) improved guest circulation; (2) concepts for renovation of four existing habitats (Cats Habitat, Great Apes, Children's Zoo, and Oklahoma Trails); (3) concepts for new habitats, including a new reptile house, a new bird habitat, and use of the southern portion of the Zoo property; 4) integration of concepts to enhance the botanical garden aspects of Zoo property; and (5) diagrammatic overlays. The master plan's project development criteria have emphasized

conservation inspiration, animal well-being, and climate suitability.

Master Plan 2024 is presented herewith for the Trust's consideration of adoption. Prioritized projects include the Africa Plateau, the Reptile Preserve, and the Heart of the Zoo. Master Plan 2024 also presents proposed enhancements for Oklahoma Trails, a new Children's Adventure area, an enhanced entry plaza, an elephant expansion, a Congo Forest, a Feline Oasis, a Biodiversity Hotspots building, and an Aquatic Garden. The Master Plan's total budget estimate is between \$115 million and \$230 million, allowing for the flexibility to pursue portions of a project or the entire scope

based on needs and finances.

Recommendation: Master Plan be adopted.






A Safari Viewing Experience

Welcome to the Africa Plateau, the first of 3 priority projects in the Oklahoma City Zoo Master Plan. Designed with the goal of replacing an outdated giraffe barn that is a maintenance concern, and utilizing the Zoo's available space more efficiently by demolishing barns that occupy essential view corridors, Africa Plateau creates an exciting new mixed species viewing experience full of crowd-pleasing African animals. From white rhinoceros, wildebeest, and zebra on the open savannas, to okapi and sitatunga in a lush forest, this exhibit truly reveals the diversity of animals and landscapes to be found in the wilds of Africa.

One of the defining features of the Africa Plateau is the range of views that can be achieved. By consolidating service needs and siting the new rhino and hoofstock barns on the perimeter of the usable animal space, extended views of the savanna are made possible. Guests will feel that they have been transported to an African safari as they look out an see a variety of species roaming freely on the grasslands. Further down the path, guests will encounter forest home of the okapi and sitatunga, a lush and dense habitat that provides a secluded and enriching environment for these unique species. The thoughtful placement of the forest within the exhibit ensures that each animal's needs for privacy, shelter, and exploration are met, while still allowing visitors to observe their captivating behaviors.

And of course, the Africa Plateau would not be complete without the carnivores of Predator Pass. The path weaves through the Savanna Stroll Gardens to the existing viewing shelters for the cheetahs and African painted dogs. This re-imagined route eliminates repetitious viewing experiences and allows the Zoo to invest in beautiful gardens that are integrated into the exhibit design. Incorporating the theming of the exhibits into the story of the planting design, the gardens transition from the "River of Grasses" on the savannas, to the "Stream & Wet Meadow" at the waterhole, and the "The Thicket" at the densely planted Okapi exhibit. With pergolas for animal viewing, carefully placed art nodes, and a new vulture exhibit nestled in the gardens, guests will enjoy discovering all the special details on the African Plateau.




World Class Reptile Habitats

The Reptile Preserve is a cutting-edge facility that redefines the standard for reptile and amphibian care and conservation. With the Jungle Gym relocated to a new home in Children's Adventure, the new Reptile Preserve can occupy that site, providing an immersive, climate controlled experience near the Zoo entry. The original structure of the herpetarium will be renovated and repurposed as a much-needed guest lounge that provides the zoo with updated restrooms, a nursing room, birthday party room, and an area for guests to take a break so they can make the most of their day at the zoo.

The Reptile Preserve is both an indoor & outdoor facility with several exhibits designed to be viewed from both inside and outside. In this building visitors will also encounter a diverse array of reptiles and amphibians thriving in environments that closely mimic their natural habitats. From the arid deserts of the Southwest to the lush rainforests of the tropics, each exhibit offers a glimpse into the remarkable adaptations and behaviors of snakes, lizards, turtles, and more. As guests explore the facility, they will walk across ravines, peer into crevices, and wander through a 360-degree gallery, where transparent enclosures offer unparalleled views of some of the world's most intriguing and elusive reptiles. Beyond the exhibits, the Reptile Preserve Building features a dedicated demonstration area and incubation zone, where visitors can witness firsthand the marvels of reptile biology and reproduction. From egg-laying turtles to snakes shedding their skin, these interactive presentations provide invaluable insights into the lives of these ancient creatures, fostering a deeper understanding and respect for their role in the ecosystem.

Surrounding the building, the reptile preserve gardens showcase a variety of native reptile and bird habitats that visitors can replicate at home, empowering individuals to become stewards of conservation in their own communities. The gardens also include an art node and pergola for relaxing while nearby, the improved ginkgo plaza serves dual purpose as garden gathering space and an area for after hours events.





The Key to a Delightful Zoo Visit

The Heart of the Zoo is a crossroads - a key point through which guests pass up to six times during a visit to the Zoo. Currently, its jumble of paths and difficult to find amenities detract from the guest experience rather than enhance it. In this plan, the Heart of the Zoo is re-imagined as an inviting, identifiable gathering space. The path from the entry gives way to the Heart of the Zoo via the vibrant display gardens of the Redbud Promenade. Consolidating and highlighting multiple exhibit entries such as: Expedition Africa, Feline Oasis, Oklahoma Trails, Congo Forest, and Sanctuary Asia, this highly trafficked portion of the Zoo now uses simplified circulation for an improved guest experience. Furthermore, guests passing through the plaza will now encounter a new central restaurant, the Redbud Café, multiple times during their visit to the Zoo.

Showcasing the beauty of working with nature instead of against it, the Heart of the Zoo brings back to daylight a natural stormwater path through the Zoo's center. This natural form of stormwater management provides the Zoo with interpretive opportunities for water conservation and low-impact development while turning what was once an engineering problem into a unique Zoo feature. Shaded seating along the edge of the seasonal stream provides a chance to enjoy a meal from the Redbud Café and creates a rendezvous spot for families near entries to multiple exhibits.

Using a walk-up counter service method, the Redbud Café allows for efficient service with abundant shaded outdoor seating. Guests can enjoy their food with multi-layered views of black bear, elk, pronghorn, and an active wetland featuring alligators. To further enhance guest comfort, exceptional restrooms with unique interior exhibits are located just off the plaza for easy access.

This project, while being in a challenging location at the center of the Zoo, is the organizational key to solving many of the Zoo's current circulation issues. By creating clearly defined exhibit entries among clustered visitor amenities, Heart of the Zoo becomes the central hub for the campus.

Enhancing a Guest Favorite

Previously the source of a major circulation dilemma for the Zoo and an area in need of updates, the revised Oklahoma Trails reimagines the guest flow as a single two-way path up the canyon rather than the hairpin it is today. Continuing to feature fan favorites such as black and brown bears, this project enhances the viewing of these animals along with creating new immersive exhibits with exciting new animal species. In addition, by simplifying guest circulation and expanding the bison exhibit footprint, a critical new connection is made between the Animal Hospital and Lotus Café where guests can view Indian rhino on their way to Sanctuary Asia.

Visitors coming from the Redbud Promenade will enjoy layered views of an active wetland with alligator, elk, and pronghorn on the plains, while possibly catching a glimpse of black bear on territorial rocks beyond the improved trail head. As guests proceed along the trails and elevated concrete walkways, they'll experience views of predators such as mountain lions, coyote, and new underwater views of brown bears. Just as the trail leaves the forested boardwalk and transitions into the plains of Oklahoma, guests will be introduced to species such as wolf, prairie dog, and bison. For those looking to extend their stay at the Zoo, the addition of up to four Oklahoma themed guest suites with private outdoor viewing of bison can be rented out as brand-new Wild Encounter experience.

An Elephant Herd with Room to Grow

As a leader in elephant care and management, the Zoo is lucky to be in a position of having a growing multi-generational herd of Asian elephants. To accommodate the growth of the herd and expand the ability to keep elephants in their natural family groups, this master plan expands Sanctuary Asia and sets a new standard for elephant care. The addition of a new elephant yard and the expansion of the existing elephant exhibit near Lotus Café are critical to create the necessary space for the growth of the heard in the years to come. By relocating the service road to the perimeter of the Zoo along the lake, the central area of Sanctuary Asia can be repurposed for animal space. In doing so, a more optimal use of land is achieved and the guest experience is improved by eliminating a confusing intersection at the Zoo. In the expanded exhibit, elephants roam freely across lush terrain and frolic in the refreshing waters of a sprawling waterhole. Hidden in that waterhole is the containment system for the elephants, making the landscape appear boundless. This innovative design not only prioritizes the well-being of the animals but also provides visitors with an immersive and unforgettable view shed.

Beyond the traditional exhibit space lies an exciting rotational habitat, where keepers can seamlessly transition between different animal species, including Asian elephants, Indian rhinos, and Asian antelope. This dynamic environment offers a layered mixed species look, just as you would see in the savannas of India. From the vantage points of the Lotus Cafe or the exclusive new elephant suites available for overnight stays, guests can marvel at the diverse wildlife that calls these Asian plains home.

Complementing the outdoor space is the introduction of a state-of-the-art indoor elephant herd room, offering a sanctuary from inclement weather and a tranquil retreat for natural behavior. Equipped with spacious accommodations, a natural substrate floor, and a climate-controlled environment, the herd room serves as a place for elephants to socialize, engage in enrichment, and receive the highest quality of care as the herd grows.








World Class Gorilla and Chimpanzee Viewing, Year Round

Welcome to the Congo Forest, a captivating exhibit renovation where guests embark on an immersive journey into the lush and vibrant ecosystem of Central Africa. As guests enter this updated exhibit they'll be introduced to a lively new addition: the black & white colobus monkeys. With their striking black and white fur and graceful acrobatics, these arboreal primates captivate audiences of all ages.

Down a forest path is a new shelter with glass walls adjacent to an updated gorilla habitat. Here visitors have a shaded opportunity to glimpse a gorilla nose-to-nose before they enter the Congo Forest building. Inside, guests are treated to a climate controlled space with intimate encounters of gorillas and chimpanzees in innovative day rooms. Large, filled with natural light and enrichment structures for climbing, these state-of-the-art day rooms provide guests with the opportunity observe great apes up close. With a glass front separating guests from the apes and an operable glass back offering views to the landscape, these day rooms are an ape version of an indoor-outdoor living room. Guests will gain an appreciation their social dynamics, intricate behaviors, and playful antics as they roam freely between their indoor and outdoor spaces.

New indoor day rooms for the gorillas and chimpanzees allow for the much-needed redesign of the original day rooms into behind scenes animal transfers and new guest facing interior exhibits showcasing the rich biodiversity of the Congo forests, including everything from elusive reptiles to vibrant amphibians. These African rainforest exhibits transform an experience once solely focused on large primates into an opportunity to introduce guests to a fragile ecosystem and share its unique conservation stories.





Step into the enchanting world of Feline Oasis, a series of immersive exhibits that transport guests into the diverse habitats and captivating lives of felines from every corner of the globe. This improved exhibit experience features larger jaguar and tiger exhibits, a big cat training demonstration wall, and seven completely renovated small cat exhibits. Designed as a series of habitats, each represents the natural environment the species of cat calls home. Ranging from the dense rainforests of South America to the vast deserts of Africa, this oasis highlights the variety cats in the animal kingdom and shows how each has adapted its individual environment.

The exhibit also incorporates a conservation message, shedding light on the challenges faced by wild cat populations due to habitat loss, poaching, and climate change. Feline Oasis not only captivates with its immersive experience but also serves to evoke both awe and respect for cat species large and small.

While felines make up the majority of this project area, spaces designated for play and native wildlife viewing are also included. As guests travel farther south toward Sanctuary Asia, they will find a nature based playground with logs and other natural elements used in lieu of traditional play equipment. Here, children will learn to see the natural environment as their playground and have the opportunity to play in a area more centrally located in the Zoo.

On the botanical side of the Zoo, this project area also includes the Bird Refuge Boardwalk. Focused on creating a habitat for native birds, the gardens in this area provide shelter and sustenance being while a quiet area for guests to enjoy bird watching with views of the lake. Hosting conservation messaging concerning local avian wildlife throughout, the Bird Refuge Boardwalk serves as an educational opportunity and allows visitors to appreciate Oklahoma's native wildlife.



Nestled along the lakeside path lies the new Biodiversity Hotspots building, a beacon of discovery showcasing the rich variety of life found in some of the world's most ecologically diverse regions. As visitors step through the glass doors, they are transported on a global journey through lush rainforests, and arid deserts, encountering a breathtaking array of wildlife and plants from across the globe. Within the confines of the building, guests encounter a harmonious mix of animal exhibits, a walk-through aviary, and interior gardens, each curated to highlight the unique biodiversity of its respective habitat.

From the dining room of the Canopy Restaurant, guests immerse themselves in the sights and sounds of nature while enjoying a meal and escaping the heat. As visitors dine, they'll witness the bustling activity of exotic birds, vibrant reptiles, and elusive mammals while having their curiosity piqued by the colors and textures of the interior gardens. Meanwhile, those traversing the guest path outside are treated to walk through views of the aviary from the upper level of the Biodiversity Hotspots building. Furthermore, guests will experience a new outdoor primate exhibit where playful monkeys activate the exterior path.

For those approaching from the lakeside path, the ground-level view of the Biodiversity Hotspots building's glass exterior soars skyward, coaxing guests to embark on a sensory journey through the world's most biologically diverse ecosystems. On the lake shore, an events tent nestled amidst aquatic gardens provides a picturesque backdrop for event rentals and gatherings; a tranquil oasis to celebrate and connect amidst the wonders of nature.

Farther down the path, guests seeking an additional bird experience will find a new climate controlled aviary. This building, focused solely on birds, will showcase a variety of species with the intent of enhancing the Zoo's collection and providing a space for conservation breeding of tropical birds.

Background: Pursuant to the provisions of Title 60 Oklahoma Statutes, Section 180.1, the

Trust requires an annual audit of its books and accounts for fiscal year 2023-

2024.

The City of Oklahoma City has renewed its contract with Allen, Gibbs & Houlik, L.C. (AGH) for external audit services. It is customary for City trusts to contract with the same external auditors as the City to achieve

efficiencies in such services.

This Audit Contract provides for an independent audit of the Oklahoma City Zoological Trust for Fiscal Year 2023-2024. The contract amount is \$44,518, which represents a 3% increase from the prior fiscal year's contract amount. The Audit shall commence as soon as practical after this Audit Contract is

approved, with field work completed by November 1st, 2024.

Cost: Not to exceed \$44,518.

Recommendation: Amendment No. 2 and Restated Audit Contract be approved.

AMENDMENT NO. 2 AND RESTATED AUDIT CONTRACT

THIS AUDIT CONTRACT ("Audit Contract") is made and entered into as of the date hereinafter set forth by and between the OKLAHOMA CITY ZOOLOGICAL TRUST, a public trust (Trust), and Allen, Gibbs & Houlik, L.C., a Limited Corporation (Audit Firm).

WITNESSETH:

WHEREAS, the Trust, pursuant to the provisions of Title 60 Oklahoma Statutes, Section 180.1, requires an annual audit of its books and accounts for fiscal year 2023-2024 (Audit); and

WHEREAS, the scope of said Audit includes the financial statements of the Trust for said fiscal year; and

WHEREAS, Audit Firm has no interest, direct or indirect, in the fiscal affairs of said Trust,

NOW THEREFORE, in consideration of the covenants herein contained, it is mutually
agreed by the parties hereto as follows:

1) Engagement

The Trust hereby appoints and engages the Audit Firm to perform the annual Audit for fiscal year 2023-2024 (July 1, 2023, through June 30, 2024) of the assets, books, records, accounts, financial statements and other evidences of financial transactions of the Trust as required by Title 60 Oklahoma Statutes, Section 180.1 et seq.; and the Audit Firm hereby agrees to perform said Audit hereunder.

2) Scope of Audit

- A. The audit services will include an examination of the financial statements of the Trust, a blended component unit of the City of Oklahoma City.
- B. The objectives of the audit services are to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements as a whole are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error, and to issue an Audit Report that include the Audit Firm's opinion. Reasonable assurance is a high level of assurance but is not

absolute assurance and therefore is not a guarantee that an Audit conducted in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United states of America (GAAS) and Government Auditing Standards issued by the Comptroller General of the United States (GAS) will always detect a material misstatement when it exists. Misstatements can arise from fraud or error and are considered material if, there is a substantial likelihood that, individually or in the aggregate, they would influence the judgment made by a reasonable user based on the financial statements. The risk of not detecting a material misstatement resulting from fraud is higher than for one resulting from error, as fraud may involve collusion, forgery, intentional omissions, misrepresentations, or the override of internal controls.

- C. The Audit shall consist of an examination of receipts and disbursements on a selected test basis consistent with GAAS and GAS to ascertain that income and receipts are accounted for, and to ascertain that expenditures and disbursements are fairly presented in the Trust's financial statements.
- D. The Audit Firm shall confirm the cash balance on hand by independent information secured from the banks and from the actual cash on hand to the extent deemed necessary by Audit Firm in accordance with GAAS.
- E. The Audit Firm shall confirm securities held as an investment by independent information secured from the banks and from actual investments on hand to the extent deemed necessary by the Audit Firm in accordance with GAAS.
- F. In accordance with GAAS, the Audit Firm shall determine that financial transactions of the Trust were conducted within the statutory provisions, Trust Indenture, Bond Indenture, and, as appropriate, will examine resolutions, orders, and minutes pertaining to financial operations which have been passed by the Trust.
- G. Audit Firm shall, insofar as is practicable, conduct the Audit in accordance with GAAS as promulgated by the Auditing Standards Board of the American Institute of Certified Public Accountants (AICPA) and "Government Auditing Standards" issued by the Comptroller General of the United States.

Those standards require that the Audit Firm comply with applicable ethical requirements. As part of the Audit in accordance with GAAS and GAS, the Audit Firm exercises professional judgment and maintains professional skepticism throughout the Audit. The Audit Firm also:

1. Identifies and assesses the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether due to fraud or error, based on an understanding of the entity and its environment, the applicable financial reporting framework, and the entity's system of internal control, design and perform audit procedures responsive to those risks, and obtain audit evidence that is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for the Audit Firm's opinion.

- 2. Consider the Trust's system of internal controls relevant to the Audit in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the Trust's internal control. However, the Audit Firm will communicate to the Trust in writing concerning any significant deficiencies or material weaknesses in internal control relevant to the audit of the financial statements that we have identified during the Audit.
- 3. Evaluates the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of significant accounting estimates made by management, as well as evaluate the overall presentation of the financial statements, including the disclosures, and whether the financial statements represent the underlying transactions and events in a manner that achieves fair presentation.
- 4. Concludes, based on the audit evidence obtained, whether there are conditions or events, considered in the aggregate, that raise substantial doubt about the Trust's ability to continue as a going concern for a reasonable period of time.

Because of the inherent limitations of an audit, together with the inherent limitations of internal control, an unavoidable risk that some material misstatements may not be detected exists, even though the Audit is properly planned and performed in accordance with GAAS and GAS.

Because the determination of waste or abuse is subjective, Government Auditing Standards do not require the Audit Firm to perform specific procedures to detect waste or abuse in the financial statement audits.

The Audit Firm's opinion shall be on the financial statements of the Trust and shall state the Audit Firm's opinion as to the fair presentation of the financial statements in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles (GAAP). GAAP shall be defined to include Governmental Accounting Standards Board (GASB) Statements, Interpretations, and applicable Statements and interpretations of the Financial Accounting Standards Board. The Audit Firm report will be addressed to the Governing Body. Circumstances may arise in which the Audit Firm report may differ from expected form and content based on results of the Audit Firm's audit. Depending on the nature of these circumstances, it may be necessary for the Audit Firm to modify the Audit Firm's opinion, or add an emphasis-of-matter paragraph or other-matter paragraph to the Audit Firm's report.

In addition to the Audit Report on the financial statements, the Audit Firm will also issue the following types of reports:

(1) Report on Internal Control Over Financial Reporting and on Compliance and Other Matters Based on an Audit of Financial Statements Performed in Accordance with GAS.

If circumstances arise relating to the conditions of the Trust's records, the availability of appropriate audit evidence, or indications of a significant risk of

material misstatement of the financial statements because of error, fraudulent financial reporting or misappropriation of assets which, in the Audit Firm's professional judgment, prevents them from completing the Audit or forming an opinion, the Audit Firm retains the unilateral right to take any course of action permitted by professional standards, including, but not limited to, declining to express an opinion or issue a report, or withdrawing from the engagement.

In the Audit Firm's connection with the audit of the financial statements, the Audit Firm's responsibility is to read the other information and consider whether a material inconsistency exists between the other information and the financial statements, or the other information otherwise appears to be materially misstated. If, based on the work performed, the Audit Firm concludes that an uncorrected material misstatement of the other information exists, the Audit Firm is required to describe it in its report.

H. The Audit Firm shall assess the adequacy of internal controls before relying on substantive tests. If it is found that the system of internal control is not adequate or is not functioning properly, more extensive examination may be done and, if considered necessary, recommendations will be made of action necessary to correct the deficiency. Such recommendations, if any, will be in the form of a management letter delivered to the Financial Manager no later than November 1, 2024 as a separate document from the Audit Firm's opinion.

The Audit Firm will also communicate to those charged with governance (a) any fraud involving senior management and fraud (whether caused by senior management or other employees) that causes a material misstatement of the financial statements that becomes known during the Audit, and (b) any instances of noncompliance with laws and regulations that they become aware of during the Audit (unless they are clearly inconsequential).

The Audit Report will report on internal control over financial reporting and over compliance will include any significant deficiencies and material weaknesses in internal control over financial reporting and over compliance of which we become aware as a result of obtaining an understanding of internal control and performing tests of internal control over financial reporting and over compliance consistent with requirements of the standards and regulations identified above. The Audit Report on compliance matters will address material errors, fraud, violations of compliance obligations, and other responsibilities imposed by state and federal statutes and regulations or assumed by contracts; and any state or federal grant, entitlement or loan program questioned costs of which we become aware, consistent with requirements of the standards and regulations identified above.

- I. The Audit Firm will maintain its independence in accordance with the standards of the American Institute of Certified Public Accountants and GAS.
- J. The Audit Firm must be available between audits to discuss financial reporting issues and practices. The Audit Firm will participate with the Financial Manager in pre-audit planning. Additionally, "between audit" discussions may include minor

tax or regulatory compliance issues. If such issues require substantial research, as well as written responses from Audit Firm, fees and charges will be negotiated.

- K. The Trust will be responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.
- L. The Trust will be responsible for the design, implementation and maintenance of internal control relevant to the preparation and fair presentation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

This includes establishing and maintaining effective internal control over financial reporting and for informing the Audit Firm of all significant deficiencies and material weaknesses in the design or operation of such controls of which it has knowledge.

The Trust is also responsible for the design and implementation of programs and controls to prevent and detect fraud, and for informing the Audit Firm about all known or suspected fraud affecting the entity involving management, employees who have significant roles in internal control, and other where the fraud could have a material effect on the financial statements. This includes informing the Audit Firm of its knowledge of any allegations of fraud affecting the entity received in communications from employees, former employees, analysts, regulators or others.

- M. Those charged with governance is responsible for informing the Audit Firm of its views about the risks of fraud, waste or abuse within the Trust, and its knowledge of any fraud, waste or abuse or suspected fraud, waste or abuse affecting the Trust.
- N. The Trust will be responsible for identifying and ensuring compliance with the laws, regulations, contracts and grants applicable to the Trust activities (including federal award programs), and for informing the Audit Firm about all known material violations of such laws or regulations, other than those that are clearly inconsequential.
- O. The Trust will be responsible to provide the Audit Firm with:
 - (1) Access to all information of which the Trust is aware that is relevant to the preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements including information relevant to disclosures.
 - (2) Draft financial statements, including information relevant to their preparation and fair presentation, when needed, to allow for the completion of the Audit in accordance with the proposed timeline.
 - (3) Additional information that the Audit Firm may request from the Trust for the purpose of the Audit.

- (4) Unrestricted access to persons within the entity from whom the Audit Firm determine it necessary to obtain audit evidence.
- (5) If applicable, responses to any findings reported in the schedule of findings and responses.
- P. The Trust is responsible for evaluating subsequent events through the date of the financial statements are issued or available to be issued, and to disclose the date through which subsequent events were evaluated in the financial statements. The Trust also agrees that it will not evaluate subsequent events earlier than the date of the Trust's representation letter.
- Q. The Trust will provide to the Audit Firm written confirmation acknowledging certain responsibilities outlined in this Audit Contract and confirming:
 - (1) The availability of this information.
 - (2) Certain representations made during the Audit for all periods presented.
 - (3) The effects of any uncorrected misstatements, if any, resulting from errors or fraud aggregated by us during the current engagement and pertaining to the latest period presented are immaterial, both individually and in the aggregate, to the financial statements taken as a whole.
- R. The Trust is responsible for obtaining audits, examinations, agreed-upon procedures or other engagements that satisfy relevant legal, regulatory or contractual requirements or fully meet other reasonable user needs in the event results of the Audit Firm tests of compliance and internal control over financial reporting performed in connection with the audit of the financial statements may not fully meet the reasonable needs of report users.
 - S. In connection with our audit, you may request us to perform certain nonaudit services, including assistance with compiling the Trust's annual financial report.

If this service is requested, GAS independence standards require that the auditor maintain independence so that opinions, findings, conclusions, judgments and recommendations will be impartial and viewed as impartial by reasonable and informed third parties. Before the Audit Firm agrees to provide a non-audit service to the Trust, we determine whether providing such a service would create a significant threat to our independence for GAS audit purposes, either by itself or in aggregate with other non-audit services provided. A critical component of the Audit Firm's determination is consideration of management's ability to effectively oversee the non-audit services to be performed. The Trust has agreed that Rebecca McReynolds, CFO possesses suitable skill, knowledge or experience and that the

- individual understands the compilation services to be performed sufficiently to oversee them. Accordingly, the management of the Trust agrees to the following:
- a. The Trust has designated Rebecca McReynolds, CFO as a senior member of management who possesses suitable skill, knowledge and experience to oversee the services;
- b. Rebecca McReynolds, CFO will assume all management responsibilities for subject matter and scope of the assistance with compiling the annual financial report;
- c. The Trust will evaluate the adequacy and results of the services performed; and
- d. The Trust accepts responsibility for the results and ultimate use of the services.
 - GAS further requires that we establish an understanding with the Trust's management and those charged with governance of the objectives of the non-audit services, the services to be performed, the Trust's acceptance of its responsibilities, the auditor's responsibilities and any limitations of the non-audit services. The Audit Firm believes this Contract documents that understanding.
- T. The Trust is responsible for the preparation of the required supplementary information (RSI) which accounting principles generally accepted in the United states of America (U.S. GAAP) require to be presented to supplement the basic financial statements. The Trust is also responsible for the preparation of the supplementary information presented in relation to the financial statements as a whole in accordance with U.S. GAAP. In addition:
 - 1. The Audit Firm will apply certain limited procedures to the required supplementary information in accordance with GAAS.
 - 2. The Trust is responsible for its preparation in accordance with applicable criteria.
 - 3. The Trust will provide certain written representations regarding the RSI and supplementary information at the conclusion of the engagement.
 - 4. The Trust will include the Audit Firm report on this supplementary information in any document that contains this supplementary information and indicates the Audit Firm has reported on the supplementary information.
 - 5. The Trust will make the supplementary information readily available to intended users if it is not presented with the audited financial statements.

3) Audit Schedule

The Audit shall commence as soon as practical after this Audit Contract is approved, with field work completed by November 1, 2024. After review by a member of Audit Firm

specializing in governmental financial reporting, a copy of the Audit Report (Audit Firm's opinion) suitable for printing shall be made available to the Financial Manager as soon as possible and no later than November 15, 2024. These dates are contingent upon the Trust providing the Audit Firm auditable records and supporting schedules no later than September 15, 2024.

4) Audited Report, Printing and Filing

The Audit Firm will timely complete and present the financial statements and Audit Report to the Trust. The financial statements will be prepared and printed by the Audit Firm. The Audit Firm will submit one copy to the Office of the State of Oklahoma Auditor and Inspector accompanied by the appropriate filing fee by December 31, 2024.

5) Compensation

Audit Firm shall be compensated in an amount not to exceed \$44.518 for services related hereunder, which includes all expenses. Periodic billings during the Audit period will not exceed 90% of the total billings. Billings must be supported by detail, showing party providing the services, date services were performed, description of services, and hours worked times applicable rates, not to exceed \$40,067. Final invoices will be submitted as the Audit progresses with final payment after the final financial statements and Audit Report have been presented to the Trust.

The Audit Firm's fees do not consider the additional efforts related and the incidence to the COVID-19 virus environment. These matters may be driven by complexities and uncertainties related to the various provisions of new laws and the continued issuance of interpretative and procedural guidance from federal agencies. Such amount will be billed based on time expended. Additional efforts or services may include:

- A. Single Audits or compliance audits for the *Coronavirus Aid, Relief, and Economic Security Act*or other COVID-19 related funding programs. If these funding programs will be subject to Single Audit requirements or other compliance audits, AGH will issue an engagement letter addendum for those services.
- B. Accounting and auditing issues such as going concern, collectability of customer and notes receivables, compliance with debt agreements, modification of lease terms, etc.

6) Special or Additional Services

In the event the Audit Firm identifies the need for special or additional services, such recommendation shall be made to the General Manager of the Trust prior to completion of the Audit. The General Manager shall determine if such services are essential.

Audit Firm will be available to provide services, related to the Audit Report, required for any debt issuances at rates, under terms and conditions, consistent with Audit Firm's

proposal, incorporated herein by reference, and this contract. Other special or additional audit services contemplated in the City's Request for Proposals dated January 12, 2016, will require a separate contract also consistent with rates, under terms and conditions, as specified in Audit Firm's proposal.

Under no circumstances will Audit Firm be considered qualified to provide special or additional audit services regarding review of contracts or proposed agreements between the Trust and any private entity for which Audit Firm also performs audit or consulting services.

All special or additional services shall be provided at rates, under terms and conditions, consistent with the Audit Firm's proposal, incorporated herein by reference, and this Audit Contract.

7) Excluded from Scope

The Audit described in paragraph 2 of this Audit Contract shall not include or contemplate the preparation of supplemental appropriations, budgets, bond issue prospectus, or other services pertaining to the operation of the Trust beyond the scope of the Audit Contract specified in Paragraph 2, above.

8) Non-Discrimination

Audit Firm agrees, in connection with the performance of services under this Audit Contract, as follows:

- A. Audit Firm will not discriminate against any employee or applicant for employment because of race, creed, color, sex, age, national origin or ancestry, or disability as defined by the Americans with Disabilities Act of 1990, Section 3(2). Audit Firm shall take affirmative action to insure that employees are treated without regard to their race, creed, religion, color, sex, age, national origin or ancestry, or disability as defined by the Americans with Disabilities Act of 1990, Section 3(2). Such actions shall include, but not be limited to the following: employment, upgrading, demotion, transfers, recruiting or recruitment, advertising, lay-off, termination, rates of pay, or apprenticeship. Audit Firm agrees to post in a conspicuous place, available to employees and applicants for employment, notices to be provided by the City Clerk of the City setting forth provisions of this section.
- B. Audit Firm agrees to include this non-discrimination clause in any subcontracts connected with the performance of this Audit Contract.
- C. In the event of Audit Firm's non-compliance with the above non-discrimination clause, this Audit Contract may be canceled or terminated by the Trust. Audit Firm may be declared by the Trust ineligible for further contracts with the said Trust until satisfactory proof of intent to comply shall be made by the Audit Firm.

9) Insurance and Indemnification

Audit Firm will comply with the indemnity and insurance requirements as follows:

Audit Firm agrees to defend, indemnify, and save harmless the Trust and the City A. and its officers, agents, and employees from and against any and all loss of or damage to tangible property, bodily injuries to or death of any person or persons; and/or damages caused by Audit Firm's disclosure of the City/Trust's Confidential information or any Personal Information, to the extent caused by the negligent acts, omissions or improper acts of Audit Firm, including, without limiting the generality of the foregoing, its partners, employees, representatives, contractors or agents, in connection with the Audit. Provided, however, Audit Firm shall not be liable thereunder for any loss or expense occasioned by the negligent acts or omissions of the Trust and the City or its officers, agents, and employees. Each party agrees to give the other parties prompt notice of any claim, suits, actions, or proceedings. The insurance requirements set forth in paragraph B shall not be deemed to limit or define the obligations of Audit Firm set forth in this paragraph. Further, the termination, cancellation, or expiration of this Audit Contract shall not affect the obligations and rights established which the parties expressly agree will survive compensation, cancellation, termination, and expiration.

In the event the Trust or the City reasonably determines there is a conflict of interest between the Audit Firm and the Trust or the City with respect to legal representation, as may be required, the Audit Firm will provide and pay for separate legal counsel to represent the interest of the Trust and/or the City.

- B. The minimum insurance requirements set forth below shall not be deemed to limit or define the obligations of Audit Firm hereunder from the provisions of paragraph A. Prior to beginning work, Audit Firm shall obtain and furnish to the City and the Trust current copies of certificates of insurance and a copy of the verification of insurance from Audit Firm's broker of the policy required in subparagraphs (1) through (5) following. The required insurance shall be maintained in full force and effect until completion and final acceptance by the Trust of the Audit Report. Audit Firm shall maintain insurance for the coverage and amounts of coverage not less than those set forth below. Except for professional liability insurance, no claimsmade policy shall be accepted. Audit Firm shall be responsible for providing the Trust actual notice of any change, reduction, suspension, lapse, or cancellation of any insurance provided under this Audit Contract at least thirty (30) days prior to such change, reduction, suspension, lapse, or cancellation.

 The amounts of such coverage shall be:
 - (1) Adequate workers' compensation coverage to comply with state laws and employer's liability coverage.
 - (2) Commercial general liability coverage sufficient to meet the City/Trust's maximum liability under the Governmental Tort Claims Act (51 O.S. §§

151 et seq.) and any amendment or addition thereto. The current required minimum commercial general liability coverage is: \$175,000 per person for bodily injury or death, \$200,000 for property damage, and \$1,000,000 for any number of claims arising out of a single accident or occurrence. All insurance provided hereunder shall name the Trust and the City as an additional insured.

- Comprehensive automobile liability coverage sufficient to meet the City/Trust's maximum liability under the Governmental Tort Claims Act (51 O.S. §§ 151 et seq.) and any amendment or addition thereto. The current required minimum comprehensive automobile liability coverage is: \$175,000 per person for bodily injury or death, \$200,000 for property damage, and \$1,000,000 for any number of claims arising out of a single accident or occurrence. All insurance provided hereunder shall name the Trust and the City additional insured.
- (4) Valuable paper insurance in an amount not less than fifty percent (50%) of Audit Firm's total fee, to assure the restoration in the event of their loss or destruction of any workpapers, documents, summaries, estimates, reports, specifications, data, calculations, computer files obtained or prepared as a part of the Audit.
- (5) Professional liability project insurance evidencing Audit Firm's coverage in an amount not less than \$175,000.

The requirements of the insurance provisions listed above shall survive the completion, expiration, cancellation, or termination of the Audit Contract. Applicable policies, unless specified otherwise, shall remain in full force and effect until the five-year workpaper retention period has expired.

The Trust and Audit Firm agree that no claim out of, from, or relating to the services rendered pursuant to this Audit Contract shall be filed more than five (5) years after the date of the Audit Report issued by the Audit Firm or the date of this Audit Contract if no report has been issued. In no event shall the Audit Firm or the Trust, or any of their respective partners, principals, officers, directors, employees, affiliates, subsidiaries, contractors, subcontractors, agents, representatives, successors, or assigns (collectively, the "Covered Parties" and each individually, a "Covered Party"), be liable for negligence that results in the interruption or loss of business, any lost profits, savings, revenue, goodwill, software, hardware, or data, or the loss of use thereof (regardless of whether such losses are deemed direct damages), or incidental, indirect, punitive, consequential, special exemplary, or similar such damages, even if advised of the possibility of such damages. To the fullest extent permitted by law, the total aggregate liability of the Covered Parties arising out of, from, or relating to the Audit Contract, or the Audit Report issued or services provided hereunder, regardless of the circumstances or nature or type of claim, including, without limitation, claims arising from a Covered Party's

negligence or breach of contract or warranty, or relating to or arising from a government, regulatory or enforcement action, investigation, proceeding, or fine, will not exceed the total amount of the fees paid by the Trust to the Audit Firm under this Audit Contract.

C. Because of the importance of oral and written management representations to an effective Audit, the City/Trust releases Audit Firm and its personnel for (1) any and all claims, liabilities, costs and expenses attributable to any knowing misrepresentation by any City or Trust employee, or (2) false or incomplete information provided by any of the City's personnel or agents to Audit Firm in the performance of the services contemplated by this agreement unless and except any act of fraud, willful misconduct or gross negligence on the part of Audit Firm's personnel or agents.

10) Venue and Applicable Law

The Trust and the Audit Firm hereby agree that any dispute which may arise between or among them arising out of or in connection with this Audit Contract shall be adjudicated before a court located in Oklahoma City, Oklahoma. The City and the Audit Firm hereby submit to the exclusive personal jurisdiction of the courts of the State of Oklahoma located in Oklahoma City, Oklahoma, with respect to any action or legal proceeding commenced by any party to the Audit Contract. The City and the Audit Firm consent to the service of process in any such action or legal proceeding by means of registered or certified mail, return receipt requested, in care of the address set forth in Paragraph 11. This Audit Contract shall be construed and enforced in accordance with the laws of the State of Oklahoma. In the event of ambiguity in any of the terms of this Audit Contract, it shall not be construed for or against any party on the basis that such party did or did not author the same.

11) Notices

Notices to the parties hereto shall be in writing, personally served, faxed with receipt confirmation or sent by first-class US mail with return receipt to:

12) Complete Agreement

This Audit Contract expresses the entire understanding and complete agreement between the Trust and Audit Firm concerning the subject matter hereof. Neither the Trust nor Audit Firm has made or shall be bound by any agreement, statement or any representation to the other concerning the subject matter hereof which is not set forth in this Audit Contract.

13) No Waiver or Modification

No waiver or modification of this audit contract or any covenant, condition, or limitation herein contained shall be valid unless by written amendment duly executed by the parties hereto. No evidence of waiver or modification shall be received in evidence of any proceedings or litigation between the parties hereto arising out of or affecting this Audit Contract, or the rights or obligations of the parties hereunder, unless such waiver or modification is in writing, duly executed as aforesaid. The parties further agree that the provisions of this paragraph may not be waived except as herein set forth.

14) Cancellation

The Trust or Audit Firm may cancel this Audit Contract upon thirty (30) days written notice to the other party. Such notice shall be deemed to be effective when received. Upon cancellation hereof, the Trust will pay Audit Firm all fees earned up to date of cancellation and Audit Firm will make available for review to the Trust and any successor auditor the working papers in Audit Firm's possession. Audit Firm will also provide copies of all Prepared By Client (PBC) documents to the City and its successor auditors.

The Trust's failure to make full payment of any and all undisputed amounts invoiced in a timely manner constitutes a material breach for which the Audit Firm may refuse to provide deliverables and/or, upon written notice, suspend or terminate our services under this Audit Contract. The Audit Firm will not be liable to the Trust for any resulting loss, damage or expense connected with the suspension or termination of the Audit services due to the Trust failure to make full payment of undisputed amounts invoiced in a timely manner.

The Audit Firm will not be responsible for any delay or failure in our performance resulting from acts beyond our reasonable control or unforeseen or unexpected circumstances, such as, but not limited to, acts of God, government or war, riots or strikes, disasters, fires, floods, epidemics, pandemics or outbreaks of communicable disease, cyberattacks, and internet or other system or network outages. At the Trust's option, the Trust may terminate this Audit Contract where our services are delayed more than 120 days; however, you are not excused from paying us for all amounts owed for services rendered and deliverables provided prior to the termination of this Audit Contract.

When an engagement has been suspended at the request of management or those charged with governance and work on that engagement has not recommenced within 120 days of the request to suspend our work, we may, at our sole discretion, terminate this Audit Contract without further obligation to you. Resumption of the Audit Firm's work following termination may be subject to the Audit Firm's client acceptance procedures and, if resumed, will require additional procedures not contemplated in this Audit Contract. Accordingly, the scope, timing and fee arrangement discussed in this Audit Contract will no longer apply. In order for the Audit Firm to recommence work, the execution of a new Audit Contract will be required.

The Audit Firm may terminate this Audit Contract upon written notice if the Audit Firm determines that the Audit Firm's continued performance would result in a violation of law, regulatory requirements, applicable professional or ethical standards, or the Audit Firm's client acceptance or retention standards.

15) Assignment

Neither this Audit Contract nor any claims, rights or obligations relating to it may be assigned, sublet, or transferred by a party hereto unless approved in writing by the other party.

16) Audit Working Papers

Audit working papers, consistent with auditors and professional standards, are the property of the Audit Firm, but shall promptly be made available to the Trust and shall be made available for copying or review by the Trust. Review of Audit Documentation by a successor auditor or as part of due diligence is subject to applicable to the Audit Firm policies, and will be agreed to, accounted for and billed separately. Any such access to our Audit Documentation is subject to a successor auditor signing an Access & Release Letter substantially in the Audit Firm's form. The Audit Firm reserves the right to decline a successor auditor's request to review our workpapers. The Trust agrees to reimburse the Audit Firm for fees and expenses it incurs if the Audit Firm is requested by the Trust or subpoenaed by the Trust to produce its working papers or personnel to testify in any matter where the Audit Firm is not also a party. The Trust acknowledges and grants your assent that representatives of the cognizant or oversight agency or their designee, other government audit staffs, and the U.S. Government Accountability Office shall have access to the Audit Documentation upon their request. The Audit Firm shall retain working papers resulting from this Audit Contract for not less than five (5) years.

17) Retention of Records

The Audit Firm will return to the Trust all original records the Trust provides to the Audit Firm in connection with this engagement. Further, in addition to providing the Trust with those deliverables set forth in this Audit Contract, the Audit Firm will provide to the Trust a copy of any records the Audit Firm prepares or accumulates in connection with such deliverables which are not otherwise reflected in the Trust's books and records without

which the Trust's books and records would be incomplete. The Trust has the sole responsibility for retaining and maintaining in the Trust's possession or custody all of the Trust's financial and nonfinancial records related to this engagement. The Audit Firm will not host, and will not accept responsibility to host, any of the Trust's records. The Audit Firm, however, may maintain a copy of any records of the Trust's necessary for the Audit Firm to comply with applicable law and/or professional standards or to exercise our rights under this Contract. Any such records retained by the Audit Firm will be subject to the confidentiality obligations set forth herein and destroyed in accordance with the Audit Firm's record retention policies.

18) Independent Contractor Status

The parties hereby acknowledge and covenant that Audit Firm is an independent contractor and will act exclusively as an independent contractor and not as an employee of the City or the Trust in performing the duties hereunder. The parties do not intend and will not hold out that there exists, any corporation, joint venture, undertaking for a profit or other form of business venture or any employment relationship among the parties other than that of an independent contractor relationship. The Trust will not withhold any social security tax, Medicare tax, federal unemployment tax, federal income tax, or state income tax from any compensation paid to Audit Firm. All such taxes, if due, are the responsibilities of Audit Firm and will not be charged to the Trust. Audit Firm agrees not to make any claims to any welfare or retirement benefits available to qualified employees of the City or the Trust, for work done in relation to this Audit Contract. Audit Firm acknowledges that as an independent contractor it is not eligible to participate in any welfare or retirement benefit programs provided by the City or the Trust for employees for any services Audit Firm provides the Trust pursuant to this Audit Contract.

19) Use of Subcontractors and Third-party Products

The Audit Firm may, in its sole discretion, use qualified third-party service providers to assist the Audit Firm in providing professional services to the Trust. In such circumstances, it may be necessary for the Audit Firm to disclose Confidential Information (as such term is defined below) to them. The Audit Firm may share the Trust's information, including Confidential Information, with these third-party service providers. The Trust acknowledges and agrees that the Audit Firm's use of a third-party service provider may involve the processing, input, disclosure, movement, transfer, and storage of your information and data outside of our technology infrastructure. The Audit Firm will be responsible to the Trust for the performance of our third-party service providers, solely as related to the services performed under this Audit Contract, subject to all limitations and disclaimers set forth herein.

The Audit Firm also may provide services to the Trust using certain third-party hardware, software, equipment, or products (collectively, "Third-Party Products" and each, individually, a "Third-Party Product"). The Trust acknowledges that the use of a Third-Party Product may involve the processing, input, disclosure, movement, transfer, and

storage of information provided by or on behalf of the Trust to the Audit Firm, including Confidential Information and Personal Information, within the Third-Party Product's infrastructure and not the Audit Firm's. Thes Trust further acknowledges that the terms of use and service, including, but not limited to, applicable laws, set forth in the end-user license, end-user subscription agreement, or other end-user agreement for such Third-Party Product (collectively, "EULA(s)") will govern all obligations of such licensor relating to data privacy, storage, recovery, security, and processing within such Third-Party Product's infrastructure, as well as, the service levels associated with such Third-Party Product. The Trust hereby consent to the disclosure of the Trust's information, including the Trust's Confidential Information and Personal Information, to the licensors of such Third-Party Products for the purpose described herein.

To the extent the Audit Firm gives the Trust access to a Third-Party Product in connection with the services contemplated herein, the Trust agrees to comply with the terms of any applicable EULA for such Third-Party Product, and the Trust shall be solely responsible for the improper use of a Third-Party Product or a violation of the applicable EULA for such Third-Party Product, by the Trust, or any user to whom the Trust grants access to such Third-Party Product. The Trust agrees to indemnify and hold AGH harmless from and against any claims, actions, lawsuits, proceedings, judgments, liens, losses, damages, costs, expenses, fees (including reasonable legal fees, expenses, and costs) and other liabilities relating to, or arising from or out of, the improper use of a Third-Party Product, or a violation of the terms of the applicable EULA for such Third-Party Product, by the Trust, or any user to whom the Trust grants access to such Third-Party Product.

The Trust acknowledges that the use of Third-Party Products may be subject to limitations, delays, interruptions, errors, and other problems which are beyond the Audit Firm's control, including, without limitation, internet outage or lack of availability related to updates, upgrades, patches, fixes, maintenance, or other issues. The Audit Firm will not be liable for any delays, delivery failures, or other losses or damages resulting from such issues. Nor will the Audit Firm be held responsible or liable for any loss, or unauthorized use or disclosure, of any information or data provided by you, including, without limitation, Personal Information provided by the Trust, resulting from the use of a Third-Party Product.

20) Confidentiality

The Audit Firm and the Trust may, from time to time, disclose Confidential Information (as defined below) to one another. Accordingly, the Audit Firm and the Trust agree as the recipient of such Confidential Information (the "Receiving Party") to keep strictly confidential all Confidential Information provided to it by the disclosing party (the "Disclosing Party") and use, modify, store, and copy such Confidential Information only as necessary to perform its obligations and exercise its rights under this Audit Contract and for no other purpose or use. Except as otherwise set forth herein, the Receiving Party may only disclose the Confidential Information of the Disclosing Party to its personnel, agents, and representatives who are subject to obligations of confidentiality at least as restrictive as those set forth herein and only for the purpose of exercising its rights and fulfilling its

obligations hereunder. To avoid any doubt, the Audit Firm is permitted to disclose the Trust's Confidential Information to the Audit Firm's personnel, agents, and representatives to provide the services or exercise its rights under this Contract for the purpose of maintaining compliance with applicable laws and professional, regulatory, and/or ethical standards.

As used herein, "Confidential Information" means, information in any form, oral, graphic, written, electronic, machine-readable or hard copy consisting of: (i) any nonpublic information provided by the Disclosing Party, including, but not limited to, all of its inventions, designs, data, source and object code, programs, program interfaces, know-how, trade secrets, techniques, ideas, discoveries, marketing and business plans, pricing, profit margins and/or similar information; (ii) any information that the Disclosing Party identifies as confidential; or (iii) any information that, by its very nature, a person in the same or similar circumstances would understand should be treated as confidential, including, but not limited to, this Audit Contract.

As used herein, the term "Confidential Information" will not include information that: (i) is publicly available at the time of disclosure by the Disclosing Party; (ii) becomes publicly available by publication or otherwise after disclosure by the Disclosing Party, other than by breach of the confidentiality obligations set forth herein by the Receiving Party; (iii) was lawfully in the Receiving Party's possession, without restriction as to confidentiality or use, at the time of disclosure by the Disclosing Party; (iv) is provided to the Receiving Party without restriction as to confidentiality or use by a third party without violation of any obligation to the Disclosing Party; (v) is independently developed by employees or agents of the Receiving Party who did not access or use the Confidential Information; or is a "record" pursuant to the Oklahoma Open Records Act.

The Receiving Party will treat the Disclosing Party's Confidential Information with the same degree of care as the Receiving Party treats its own confidential and proprietary information, but in no event will such standard of care be less than a reasonable standard of care. The Receiving Party will promptly notify the Disclosing Party if it becomes aware that any of the Confidential Information of the Disclosing Party has been used or disclosed in violation of this Audit Contract.

Notwithstanding the foregoing, in the event that the Receiving Party becomes legally compelled to disclose any of the Confidential Information of the Disclosing Party, or as may be required by applicable regulations or professional standards, the Receiving Party will use commercially reasonable efforts to provide the Disclosing Party with notice prior to disclosure, to the extent permitted by law.

21) <u>Data Protection Compliance</u>

The Audit Firm takes reasonable steps to comply with privacy, cybersecurity, and data protection laws that may apply to Personal Information and Confidential Information the Audit Firm processes on behalf of our clients.

The Audit Firm and the Trust acknowledge and agree that they may correspond or convey information and documentation, including Confidential Information and Personal Information, via various forms of electronic transmission, including, but not limited to, Third-Party Products, such as, email, FTP and cloud-based sharing and hosting applications (e.g., portals, data analytics tools, and helpdesk and support ticketing applications), and that neither party has control over the performance, operation, reliability, availability, or security of these electronic transmissions methods. Therefore, neither party will be liable for any loss, damage, expense, harm, disclosure or inconvenience resulting from the loss, delay, interception, corruption, unauthorized disclosure, or alteration of any electronic transmission where the party has used commercially reasonable efforts to protect such information. The Audit Firm offers its clients various platforms for the exchange of information. The Trust hereby agrees that the Trust shall be bound by and comply with any and all user terms and conditions made available (whether by link, click-through, or otherwise) with respect to such platforms.

Personal Information

As used herein, the term "Personal Information" means any personal information that directly or indirectly identifies a natural person as may be defined by applicable privacy, data protection or cybersecurity laws, and includes, but is not limited to, nonpublic, personally identifiable information such as Social Security numbers, Social Insurance numbers, driver's license numbers or state- or province-issued identification card numbers, credit or debit card numbers with or without any required security code, number or passwords, health information, and other personal information as defined by applicable laws, whether of the Trust or the Trust's customers or other third parties.

Each party to transmit Personal Information consistent with applicable laws and any other obligations with the respective party may have. In the event you transmit to us Personal Information in an unencrypted format or via unencrypted means, you agree that we have no obligation to notify you of the foregoing.

The Trust represent and warrant that the Trust has provided all notices and obtained all consents required under applicable data protection laws prior to the Trust collection, use and disclosure to us or the Audit Firm's Subcontractors of such Personal Information and shall take reasonable steps to ensure that such Personal Information does not include irrelevant or unnecessary information about individuals.

The Audit Firm (i) will not Sell or Share any Personal Information received from the Trust; (ii) will not retain, use, or disclose Personal Information to another business, person, or third party, except for the purpose of maintaining or providing the services or exercising our rights as specified in this Engagement Letter, including to provide Personal Information to advisers or sub-contractors, to maintain or provide the services provided under this Audit Contract, or to the extent such disclosure is required by law.

The Audit Firm agrees to maintain appropriate security measures to protect such Personal Information in accordance with applicable laws.

If the Audit Firm becomes aware of an unauthorized acquisition or use of Trust-provided Personal Information, the Audit Firm will promptly inform the Trust of such unauthorized acquisition or use as required by applicable laws and, upon the Trust's written request, reasonably cooperate with you at your sole cost in support of any breach notification requirements as imposed upon you by applicable laws. If such unauthorized acquisition or use of Trust/City-provided Personal Information is caused by Audit Firm's negligence, Audit Firm shall cooperate with the Trust/City at Audit Firm's sole expense and indemnify the Trust/City for any damages caused by the unauthorized acquisition.

22) Validity

The invalidity or unenforceability of any provision of this Audit Contract shall not affect the validity or enforceability of any other provisions of this Audit Contract, which shall remain in full force and effect.

23) No Waiver

The failure or neglect of the Trust to insist, in any one or more instances, upon the strict performance of any of the terms or conditions of this Audit Contract, shall not be construed as a waiver of such term or condition nor the relinquishment in the future of such term or condition, but such term or condition shall continue in full force and effect.

24) Order of Precedence

The order of precedence shall be as follows:

- (a) Audit Contract
- (b) RFP
- (c) Response

25) Electronic Transmittals

Each party hereto agrees that any electronic signature of a party to this Audit Contract or any electronic signature to a document contemplated hereby (including any representation letter) is intended to authenticate such writing and shall be as valid, and have the same force and effect, as a manual signature. Any such electronically signed document shall be deemed (a) to be "written" or "in writing," (b) to have been signed and (c) to constitute a record established and maintained in the ordinary course of business and an original written record when printed from electronic files. Each party hereto also agrees that electronic delivery of a signature to any such document (via email or otherwise) shall be as effective as manual delivery of a manual signature. For purposes hereof, "electronic signature" includes, but is not limited to, (a) a scanned copy (as a "pdf" (portable document format) or other replicating image) of a manual ink signature, (b) an electronic copy of a traditional signature affixed to a document, (c) a signature incorporated into a document utilizing touchscreen capabilities or (d) a digital signature. This Audit Contract may be executed in one or more counterparts, each of which shall be considered an original instrument, but all of which shall be considered one and the same agreement. Paper copies or "printouts," of

such documents if introduced as evidence in any judicial, arbitral, mediation or administrative proceeding, will be admissible as between the parties to the same extent and under the same conditions as other original business records created and maintained in documentary form. Neither party shall contest the admissibility of true and accurate copies of electronically signed documents on the basis of the best evidence rule or as not satisfying the business records exception to the hearsay rule.

26) Other

If the Trust/City intends to publish or otherwise reproduce the financial statements and make reference to the Audit Firm or the Audit in a document other than an official statement, the Trust/City agrees to provide the Audit Firm with the printer's proofs or a master for their review and consent before reproduction and/or release occurs. The Trust/City also agrees to provide the Audit Firm with a copy of the final reproduced material for the Audit Firm's consent before it is distributed or released. Fees for any additional services that may be required as a result of the above will be established with the Trust/City at the time such services are determined to be necessary. In the event the auditor/client relationship has been terminated when the Trust/City seeks such consent, the Audit Firm will be under no obligation to grant such consent or approval

Fees for any additional services that may be required as a result of the above will be established with the Trust/City at the time such services are determined to be necessary. In the event the auditor/client relationship has been terminated when the Trust/City seeks such consent, the Audit Firm will be under no obligation to grant such consent or approval.

The Audit Firm's professional standards require that the Audit Firm perform certain additional procedures, on current and previous years' engagements, whenever a partner or professional employee leaves the Audit Firm and is subsequently employed by or associated with a client in a key position. Accordingly, the Trust agrees to compensate the Audit Firm for any additional costs incurred as a result of the Trust's employment of one of the Audit Firm's partners, principals or employees, in an amount not to exceed \$50,000.

Both parties to this Audit Contract have made a substantial investment in their respective employees and depend upon them. Because of this, Audit Firm and the Trust agrees that neither party (including related affiliates) shall hire, nor solicit for hire, any shareholder or professional employee assigned to the team performing this Audit by the other during the term of the service relationship and for a period of one year after the termination of this Audit Contract. Since auditing standards require the Audit Firm perform certain additional procedures on current and previous years engagements whenever a shareholder or professional employee leaves the Audit Firm and is subsequently employed by or associated with a client, the Trust agrees to compensate the Audit Firm for any additional costs incurred as a result of the Trust's employment of a shareholder or professional employee of the Audit Firm assigned to and engaged in this Audit.

In accordance with GAS, a copy of the Audit Firm's most recent peer review report will

be provided to the Trust in the audit planning communication letter addressed to the governing body.

Each party hereto affirms it has not been placed on a Sanctioned List (as defined below) and will promptly notify the other party upon becoming aware that it has been placed on a Sanctioned List at any time throughout the duration of this Audit Contract. The Trust shall not, and shall not permit third parties to, access or use any of the deliverables provided for hereunder, or Third-Party Products provided hereunder, in violation of any applicable sanctions laws or regulations, including, but not limited to, accessing or using the deliverables provided for hereunder or any Third-Party Products from any territory under embargo by the United States or Canada. The Trust shall not knowingly cause the Audit Firm to violate any sanctions applicable to the Audit Firm. As used herein "Sanctioned List" means any sanctioned person or entity lists promulgated by the Office of Foreign Assets Control of the U.S. Department of the Treasury, the U.S. State Department., the Consolidated Canadian Autonomous Sanctions List, the United Nations Security Council, the European Union, and United Kingdom.

Any term of this Audit Contract that would be prohibited by or impair our independence under applicable law or regulation shall not apply, to the extent necessary only to avoid such prohibition or impairment.

27) Parties' Understandings Concerning Situation Around COVID-19

To the extent any of the services described herein require a party to visit ("Visiting Party") the other party's facilities ("Host Party") in person, the Visiting Party agrees to comply with the Host Party's rules and regulations regarding COVID-19 safety protocols while on the Host Party's premises, provided the Visiting Party is made aware of such rules and regulations. Further, in the event any of the services described herein need to be suspended and/or rescheduled by a party due to the ongoing situation surrounding COVID-19, the party requesting the suspension or rescheduling of the services will provide the other party with prompt written notice of the foregoing. To the extent such suspension and/or rescheduling of the services impacts either the cost of the services or the ability of the Trust or AGH to meet any deadlines or timeframes set forth herein, or both, the parties will document this in a written agreement mutually agreed upon and executed by both parties.
